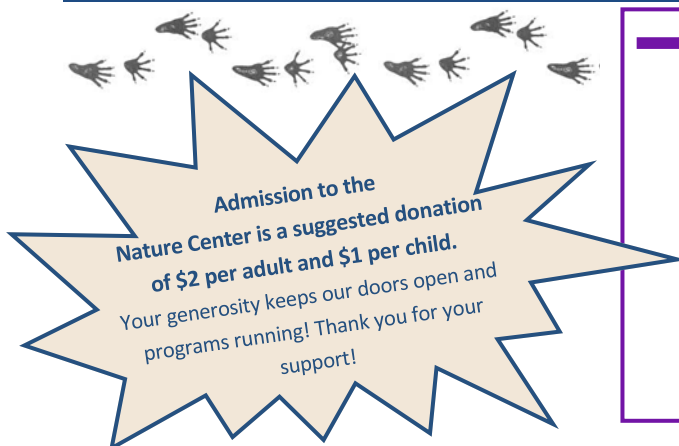

<p>January 6—Cold Blooded Critters: Where do cold-blooded animals go when the temperature drops? Learn all about the amazing survival process that reptiles and amphibians go through in order to live through the winter.</p> <p><i>*This program will be a presentation.</i></p> 	<p>January 7—Under the Oaks: Our mighty oaks provide food and shelter for many animals and insects. Learn how to identify the three species of oak trees found in the Nature Preserve and discover who may be living in them.</p> <p><i>*This program will be a hike.</i></p>
<p>January 13—Crown of Antlers: The bucks are in their winter glory with beautiful antler crowns. Grab your binoculars to catch a closer look at the black-tailed deer in their habitat and learn more about their world.</p> <p><i>*This program will be a hike.</i></p>	<p>January 14—Plants with Purpose: Come walk with a naturalist through the nature center's garden. Learn plant identification and adaptations.</p> <p><i>*This program will be a small walk.</i></p> 
<p>January 20—Birding for Families: Bring the family out for birding and a nature walk led by our special guest guides from the Sacramento Audubon Society. Birdwatchers of all levels welcomed! Make sure to bring your binoculars or borrow a pair from us.</p> <p><i>*This program will be a hike.</i></p> 	<p>January 21—Walk on the Wild Side: Winter casts its chilly spell and gives nature its own special winter beauty. Walk with a naturalist and explore this season in the oak woodland.</p> <p><i>*This program will be a hike.</i></p>
<p>January 27—Turkey Vulture Adventure: What bird wants meat but doesn't kill its own food? These relatives of the condor and stork are intelligent, family-oriented, and play games together! Learn more about these amazing birds and their importance to the ecosystem. <i>*This program will be a presentation & a hike.</i></p>	<p>January 28—Animal Tracks & Signs: There are many animal-made signs in the woods that reveal who has used the trail before you. Become a nature detective by playing tracks & scat games then take a walk to find some animal signs in the Nature Study Area. <i>*This program will be a presentation & a hike.</i></p>
